

Reports

Research Meeting: William Field Logbook 15 February 2018

Present: Phil & Pat Rowland, Barbara Copeland, Margaret Brandon, Stuart Harling, Nigel Mills, Lyn Prescott, Catherine Bottomley, Sue Jones, Rose Clark, John & Robert Kerr.

Pat presented a background and progress report of the logbook project. Full notes are available on the CPLHS website (under Latest news or Resources). The Log Book has been transcribed and proof read and the transcription is now being finally corrected. If the original logbook is donated to the Cumbria Archives they require it to be conserved at a cost of approx. £180 (2013 estimate).

Currently the digitised document will only be available to those who attended the meeting, but in the future we plan to make it available to all members of the Society. A draft is available to the above via the Members Only Resources Page (password to be advised). In future, there will be a William Field page for the website.

The Kerrs showed some photos of the Field family. It is hoped that the individuals will be identified and the pictures made available for future publications. A family tree is also required.

Publication of the transcription was not thought viable because of the limited market but the resource provides a superb opportunity for research and publishing articles/booklets based on the research. Although we now own the copyright, John Kerr agreed to ask the family if they had any concerns over publishing material from the document.

The main interest appears to be in a series of themed booklets eg Family, Buildings, A year in the life, Church, Trade, Sports etc. Those present were asked to provide further feedback on how they plan to use the resource for their research. Pat will produce an index of the research she has carried out and share articles that she has written.

Research Meeting: Census Records 12 April 2018

CPLHS held a research meeting on 12 April 2018 in the supper room of Cartmel Village Hall. The main topic for the meeting was an illustrative talk on the use of the digitised census database. Phil Rowland showed the census records relating to Outerthwaite Farm. From the digitised spreadsheet the records were easily accessible in contrast to Findmypast where it is more difficult to extract information by location. The main strength of the resource is the ability to extract statistics and Phil presented data on the population and occupations in the Parish of Cartmel. The difficulty arises because there was no standard method for recording each occupation. To overcome this, Peter Roden, the architect of the project, has produced a standardised description for occupations. For examples, agricultural labourers are described 45 different ways! The other issue which has been addressed by Peter is the location of the property. Only an address is recorded in the census and he has allocated a village or area to each record. This enable me to present information on the main occupations of those residing in the village of Allithwaite. Members should contact Nigel Mills to receive a USB stick with this spreadsheet. The memory stick also contains the digitised 1939 register, a document archive (also demonstrated at the meeting), a photo archive and other resources at a modest cost. After the presentations, two members talked about their research.

The next research meeting will be held in the Cartmel Village Hall supper room on 29th November 2018 from 2:00-4:00pm. Members who are conducting research on Agriculture will give short presentations on topics such as Field names, Wyke, Speelbank and Outerthwaite Farms, Land improvement, short-horned cattle and pounds and Pinfolds. Do come along to support this event.

Visit: Old Hall Farm, Bouth

On 3rd May a group of seventeen members assembled at Old Hall Farm where we were greeted by Charlotte Sharphouse who gave us a history of the development of the Farm since its purchase by her, her husband, Alex, and his father, Mark. The farm now gives an authentic portrayal of how a traditional Lakeland farm would have been in times past.

It was fitting that our visit began with a demonstration of the use of two Shire horses in chain harrowing a field which it was proposed to plant with maize. Charlotte worked the horses, walking with them and giving them commands. One was more experienced than the other and it was fascinating to see them working together.

We then had a tour of the farm buildings, seeing the stables, the workshops, the steam engines, blacksmiths shop and the dairy and milking parlour. There is a wealth of steam engines - in which Alex is particularly interested. The farm experience is one that children can readily share as there is a play barn, pedal tractors and ample opportunity to meet and feed the animals.

The farmhouse has been renovated to retain many of its vernacular features and the old barns and the farm workers cottage can be seen.

Our visit concluded with refreshments in the Chicken Shed Tearoom where the cakes were a particular attraction.

Sadly, we were not blessed with the best of weather but a return visit was in the minds of most of us. An enjoyable visit full of interest and a true glimpse into the past.

News

CPLHS Archive Launch

We have just compiled and now make available to members our archive of documents, images, transcriptions of oral history interviews and other items of interest to researchers collected by the CPLHS over our 20 year history.

The following archives are in the first release:

1. CPLHS Document Archive: An excel spreadsheet with 119 documents listed and searchable. They are described primarily using village name and available on line as a pdf or hard copy on request. Work is still in progress to enlarge this database and provide more detail of each document in the spreadsheet.

2. CPLHS 2016 Anniversary Image Archive. The images in this collection of 275 images from 2015/2016 were submitted by members to our Anniversary Year Competition. They represent the "Tapestry of Village Life" in the peninsula and the collection is still growing.

3. CPLHS Pre 2016 Image Archive. This collection of 625 images contains donated images of photographs and postcards, **not all having copyright permission**, and form an historical collection invaluable to local history researchers interested in the Cartmel Peninsula.

4. CPLHS Grange Then Collection. This is a collection of 2580 images collected by the CPLHS and the Grange Photographic Society in 2000 with additional images added since. They are for reference purposes only but some real historical gems can be found in this collection.

The planned additions to the archive include:

5. Copies of 1848 OS maps. Four zoomable maps of the Cartmel Peninsula. Added April 2018.

6. The CPLHS Census Database. An archive containing copies of original Enumerators sheets and an excel spreadsheet of all entries. Added April 2018.

7. The 1939 Register. An archive containing copies of the original register entries with redacted lines, and an excel spreadsheet of entries. Added April 2018.

8. CPLHS Library Archive. Books and publications held by CPLHS and available for use by members of CPLHS.

9. CPLHS Oral History Archive. List of interviews conducted by CPLHS and Cartmel Village Society and transcriptions. Recordings of interview are also available from CPLHS.

The archive is still very much "a work in progress" and is being added to regularly by members donations.

A recent donation by Peter le Mare is a pdf copy of the document *Souvenir Programme of the Grange Over Sands Bathing Pool Official Opening* in 1932. A fascinating read full of detail. If anyone has any documents of interest to lend to us for copying please get in touch.

A plaque on a seat by The Prom Café led Bill Robinson, who is looking into the development of local bus services after WW1 in the then North Lancashire area, to contact us to ask if we had any information. I have carried out some research and written an article which will be on the society

Lindale in the 1930s and 1940s

In March this year, Brenda Tyler, who lives in Shropshire, informed the society that she had been born in Ulverston in 1943 and that she had lived with her grandfather, Matthew Winder, at 3 Yew Tree Terrace in Lindale. Brenda's mother had worked at the Grand Hotel as a waitress in 1942 and 1943.



Brenda asked two questions:

- Did anyone remember a Fish and Chip shop in Lindale run by Matthew Winder and his daughter Elizabeth Winder in the 1930s or 1940s?
- Does anyone know anything about a bus accident on Lindale Hill during WW2 that killed soldiers? Were any munitions factories in the area in WW2?

Sylvia Woodhead, by asking local residents, discovered that one person remembered the Winders and that the Fish and Chip shop was next to the Mason's Arms and she forwarded photographs of Yew Tree Terrace and the Mason's Arms to Brenda Tyler. No-one could remember a bus accident that killed soldiers. Brenda was also informed that the nearest munitions factory was in Barrow in WW2.

If anyone reading this also remembers or knows about the Winder's Fish and Chip shop in Lindale or a bus crash involving soldiers in WW2 or even a closer munitions factory than the one in Barrow then please contact one of the committee members so Brenda can be informed. Barbara Copeland
