


Historical Road Signs

New Publication

A history of Lindale's 'new' Bowling Green 1992-2006

The initial inspiration for this new book was John Beckett's article in the CPLHS Newsletter of June 2017, about the opening in 1992 of a bowling green at Allithwaite Bowling Club. The new green at Allithwaite was the topic of conversation in Lindale's Top House (The Royal Oak) one evening when the idea for a bowling green in Lindale was first raised. In the 1990s Lindale didn't have much provision for leisure. But after a meeting in the Top House a few people decided to see if there was interest in making a bowling green in Lindale. A public meeting in 1992 showed enough support, so a team of people investigated where a bowling green could be built, not an easy job in a steep village like Lindale. In the end a small group of hard-working individuals constructed the green themselves; a tremendous achievement. Some of them spent every weekend for three years on the work parties. In 2006 the Bowling Green was officially opened by Tim Farron. Lindale's bowling green is only just over 10 years old; very recent history, but the CPLHS have suggested that we should record the



present day as 'tomorrow's history'. In 2016 I submitted a short account to the CPLHS about the group of Lindale peo-

ple who had constructed Lindale's bowling green. Some of these people are no longer with us. Nigel Mills commented that this account needed more historical research and documentary evidence. These materials have been collected, and are presented in a detailed appendix to the new book. Illustrated with photos of the green and its constructors, details of the fund raising events, such as the Grand Auction of Promises and the Fashion Show, this book, complied by Sylvia Woodhead and designed by John Shippen, is on sale for £5 from either Lindale Bowling Association or from Lindale Stores. Kuerdon Maps of Cartmel

A series of hand-drawn maps of the Cartmel peninsula, c.1684. These ten maps are the working papers of a surveyor, thought to be Richard Kuerden, of Kuerden near Preston. A physician by training, he began the task of compiling material for a history of Lancashire with Christopher Towneley of Carr Hall, near Burnley. The surveyor set out to map the whole of the Cartmel peninsula in two groups of surveys, mapping both the roads and the administrative boundaries.

Peterloo Massacre

The University of Manchester has an online digitised archive featuring the events leading up to and following the Peterloo Massacre on 16 August 1819. Magistrate William Hulton ordered the yeomanry to arrest speakers at a demonstration at St Peter's Field in Manchester. His collection of documents bought by Lancashire Archives in 2014 included a 1418 document from John Till. - Bowling clubs/greens in the Cartmel Peninsula pre WWII.
- Families living at the original Head House (there are two much newer properties), near High Newton, especially the Barrow family, 1674 to early 1800s.

- Cark: its shops, trade and commercial activities based from the railway and related to the Over Sands route and the
 opening up of the railway station. Land ownership in Cark especially the Rawlinson & Grayrigg families.
- The Newby family of which there are several branches on the Cartmel Peninsula: Barber Green, Wall Nook,
 Beckside and Grange. Related to this family are the Harrisons of the Landings & Wraysholme. The Meredith family
 and Newby Wilson who died in Ambleside in the early twentieth century.

- Industries in Cark & Lower Holker township generally, with a focus on the mills in Cark including Holker Mill.
- Flookburgh Farm/Stockale Farm.
- Shipbuilding activities at Cark and across the peninsula, which appear to have hit a boom around 1730.
- Railways, especially across the peninsula, the complexities of land ownership and the Stockdale family.
- Priory rentals and related documents from just before and at the reformation. All are in a free rather than formal hand, are in late mediaeval latin thus meaning they'll take a lot of patience to interpret and translate.
- Late 16th century court rolls for Cartmel and Flookburgh Manors. These appear to be in English but again in a free
 hand of the period. Any offers of help from anyone experienced in medieval latin texts would be much appreciated.

Background to David's research on Wraysholme Tower:

I have lived and worked in the Peninsula for 50 years. The early years of my life were spent working on the farms Raven Winder and Canon Winder. While working on the farms I became aware of many tales and legends that sprung up along the way, those tales left me wondering if the tales could be substantiated. I chose Wraysholme Farm to research because to my mind many tales seem to emanate from there. While visiting Stephen Morris and his mother Margaret at Wraysholme Tower I explained what I had heard and how I came to be here, at this point I was shown many documents and other items that substantiated much of what I had learnt over those many years. I asked the Society Committee for help, for I knew that in all probability the task was too much for me. Many of the documents were water-stained and some were stuck together and needed careful handling. The situation was made much easier for me with the help of Pat Rowland and her husband Phil to whom I owe many thanks. With these documents much information was gleaned. Pat and Phil helped with other information like wills which they retrieved from the Archives at Preston and records from newspapers of the families from Wraysholme. The timeline of the Tower can now be seen from the time of the Dickinson family through to present times. The Haveringtons and the Stanleys are families that were there before the Dickinsons. Much of their history can be found in the many historical books that have been produced over the years and to my surprise I found a lot of similarity in how the Haveringtons (Harrington's) family arrived in the Cartmel Peninsula to my own and through research I find that my ancestors had connections with Cartmel Priory from early mediaeval times. This is still a work in progress. Information that I have yet to uncover is when farming on the site first occurred, different crops that were grown in various times, names of the fields & did the land have to be drained. I think that when it was built it was built on an island surrounded by the sea, and to my thoughts there could well be a Grave book (Reeve book). This would be a book kept by the farmer nominated by the lord of the Manor or by the other farmers to collect rents and taxes and basically see to the overall running of the farms of the Manor (my own family once held this position on another manor not too far away).

7 February 2019 - Richard Sanderson - Backbarrow Ironworks

Backbarrow Ironworks have been described by Historic England as "the best illustration nationally of iron-smelting technology development from the early C18 to the C20".
