## 175th Anniversary of the formation of Furness Railway

Furness Line Community Rail Partnership have a project in hand to celebrate 175 years of the formation of the Furness Railway, which was so important in the development of the Furness rail line that many of us use regularly to travel to Lancaster and beyond.

## A bit of history of our railways


Following the opening of the first railway line from Stockton to Darlington, there followed a huge number of railway openings and "Railway Mania" became the term for the decades that followed. At that time the slate quarries in the Kirkby in Furness area and the iron ore mines in Dalton were transported by horse and cart to Piel pier for onward shipment. After the usual issues relating to land ownership and Parliamentary approval, the Furness Railway ran its first goods train in July 1846 and passengers to Piel Station later that year (The current roadway to Roa Island is on the original trackbed). Having established this the attention turned to the establishment of a rail link to Lancaster (please see overleaf).

## What happened next

After a period of extensive consultation and lobbying the Ulverstone (sic) and Lancaster Railway ("ULR") was formed and built the railway that is the one on which we now travel. The building of the viaducts across the Leven and Kent estuaries was challenging and the ULR was taken over by the Furness Railway and the whole line was opened in 1857.

## Our celebration plans

At the invitation of the Furness Line Community Rail Partnership and the Lakes Line Community Rail Partnership members of the Station Adoption Groups have joined with Northern Rail and other organisations to establish a programme of events to celebrate the event. For several years a Festival of Transport has been held in Barrow in July each year. This year it is planned for Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> July and we are planning to launch our programme of celebrations there. We've been submitting bids for funding and are hopeful that Furness Railway number 20, a locomotive built in 1863 will be making an appearance. Along the line, we're working with the Station Adoption Groups to set up displays at stations along the line and Leslie Gilpin, a CPLHS member and author of the book "The Ulverstone and Lancaster Railway" will be doing a talk on Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> August on the opening of the line and its impact on travel that we now enjoy.

## **Database of Cartmel Parish Registers**

Cartmel Priory's Registers of baptisms, marriages and burials start in 1559, and transcripts up to 1837 were published in four stages between 1907 and 2004. There are copies of these four publications in the CPLHS Archives, all in digital pdf files.

Although all four transcript volumes have indexes, for users wishing to extract lists of families or places of interest to them, it can be a laborious and time consuming job to look up every reference from the indexes and make notes of relevant entries. Accordingly, a database has been compiled in an Excel file as a more user-friendly tool for finding and extracting relevant information.

That database is now available in the CPLHS Archives, and complements the database of census records, covering an earlier period than the latter. The database includes almost 44,000 records, and has some introductory notes for users. In addition to the source text from the transcripts, every record in the database has additional fields of data for searching by family name, residence, etc.

## **Lindale Inn – Mystery of the lost Caricatures**



A joint effort by villagers to restore a memorable record of those locals during World War II who were regulars at the village pub, the Lindale Inn, known as the Village Inn at that time. During the Second World war, an RAF pilot Theo Dawson who it is believed was stationed at Cark airfield, made some drawings, caricatures, of the regulars at the Lindale Inn, including himself. The collection of drawings was on display at the Inn for many years but disappeared sometime around the early 2000s, though fondly remembered by many of the villagers. For some years there was talk in Lindale about the cartoon drawings and their whereabouts. Sylvia Woodhead, who has a keen interest in local history and is a member of the Cartmel Peninsula Local History Society. undertook some researches into the drawings. She was contacted by a former resident of the Inn who had taken photos of the drawings on his return visit to Lindale. Eventually the original drawings were tracked down to a local man who had them in safe keeping. In the meantime the Inn closed and then was demolished in 2019.

The drawings were in a poor state having deteriorated over the years and were not very legible. Vic Greenhalgh, who lives in Lindale and who

enjoys painting and drawing, decided it would be good to try to restore them so that people could enjoy them again. After some attempts to try and enhance the images and make them more legible Vic has carefully recreated his version of the caricatures using washes of colour, which immediately brought them to life. The finished work can be seen in the window of Greywalls Studio, Lindale, which is opposite the former Inn site. There has been lots of interest with people remembering the characters in the drawings. Someone has contacted Vic as he recognised his father in http://www.cartmel-peninsula-lhs.org.uk/



the drawings. It has brought back happy memories of the Inn. Little is known about Theo Dawson, the original artist and despite some extensive searching it has not been possible to trace him or his family. ## Plague Pestilence and Famine in the Cartmel Peninsula

It is ironical that I published an article on this subject on the CPLHS website last February, without any foresight into our impending pandemic and associated lockdown. My interest in the subject was aroused when trawling through the transcripts from the Parish registers and noticing the summary tables showing the numbers of burials for each year. High mortality was apparent locally in 1597, 1623, 1670 and 1729, and associated not only with epidemics or plague, but also famine due to the poor climate and failed harvests. Although there was a shortage of some foodstuffs due to panic buying at the beginning of the 2020 pandemic, the major factor in the current plague appears to be the transmission through social mobility.

# Research Queries – received by the Society

## Can you help identifying a newspaper?

Two poems written by Betty Bulling during the Second World War were published in local newspapers. One is about The Bay and the other is about Humphrey Head. Both are very evocative and capture the places beautifully.

The family of Constance Mary Bulling, known as Betty, thought she was evacuated to Grange. Born in 1921, by 1939 Betty would have been at Hornsey High School in Haringey. It is known that she and her sister Estelle cared for their gran, who was blind by this time. In October 1943 & February 1944 she was involved in amateur dramatic productions in Muswell Hill. At age 22-23, she would no longer be a school student; but we know she trained to be an infants' school teacher at some point. Many of her war poems depict the suffering experienced during air-raids.

Her niece found two undated press cuttings with the information they were written when Betty lived at The Knoll, Grange-over-Sands, amongst her possessions. She has contacted us hoping we might be able to identify the property where she lived, the date and where they were published.

We have established that the property was The Knoll on Fernhill Road that has a wonderful view over Morecambe Bay. In the 1939 Register The Knoll was occupied by Ada Dawson, a widow, born in 1884. Looking at news items on the reverse of the cuttings we have identified that the date of publication was in the second half of 1946. The electoral register recorded her and Ada Dawson at The Knoll at that date but we do not have any other information about how long Betty was in Grange and if she was working.

Do you know anything about Ada Dawson or Betty Bulling or which newspaper the cuttings are from? If you can help solve this mystery please contact Pat Rowland.
